Jesus, the Good Shepherd, responds to the people with compassion.-Last week, Jesus sent the Twelve on mission to teach and heal. In today's gospel, the Twelve return from their missionary activity and Jesus listens to their reports of all they have done. The report must have been exhaustive as Jesus recognized their need for rest. As they traveled toward the Sea of Galilee for retreat and rest, the crowds continued to follow Jesus and the Twelve as they were hungry for guidance. Even though Jesus was seeking solace for the Twelve, "his heart was moved with pity" for the crowd. Jesus did not turn away, but rather Jesus's compassion was a model for those who would continue his mission, those who would continue to shepherd others. In responding to the needs of the flock, Jesus gives us the priorities of the Good Shepherd: serve the people, care for the people, build up the people. If you continue reading Mark's gospel after this week's verses, you will find the Feeding of the Five Thousand is the next chapter. The Good Shepherd continues to model what it means to shepherd as he literally and figuratively feeds his sheep. **Reflection:** At times, we may find ourselves tired and "burnt out." What spiritual practices do you turn to when facing times of weariness?
